# **Set subject Theme Definitions**

Theme	Definition		
Old signs	These can be road signs, advertising, signs on a wall, that show wear and tear or		
	are quirky or full of character. They should look old. This does not include graffiti.		
Chiaroscuro	Chiaroscuro, is an Italian term that refers to the intense contrast of light (chiar)		
(Light/dark)	and dark (oscuro) to create a strong and dramatic mood. The images must have a		
	strong contrast between light and dark, use extreme low key and high-contrast		
	lighting to create distinct areas of light and darkness.		
Vanishing Point	The vanishing point is a point in the image where parallel lines appear to converge		
	in the distance.		
Time	Clocks, watches or any item that depicts time. This can include sundials, calendars,		
	egg timer, stop watches etc. It cannot include an aspect of people aging or crossing		
	a finishing line.		
Abandoned	A single structure or a group of buildings. Interiors or exteriors (or both) must		
Buildings	convey a sense of dereliction and decay.		
City 'scapes	Image to have a visual appearance of a city or urban area; a city landscape. A		
	single building would be regarded as architecture and not a city scape.

From 1 to 2 star – 10 Club Gold Awards From 2 to 3 star – 25 Club Gold Awards From 3 to 4 star – 50 Gold Awards plus 10 Salon Acceptance From 4 to 5 star – 100 Gold Awards and 25 Salon Acceptances

# **Technical Feedback and Training**

### **Megapixels and Print Sizes**

As a matter of interest, the following table contains a rough guide for the relationship between print size and quality, in respect of a random selection of MP resolutions. The data refers to the "normal" viewing distance of +- 300mm (as viewing distance increases so the resolution can be decreased).

MP	Resolution	Approximate Print Size (mm)
3	2048 x 1536	173 x 130
12	4256 x 2832	360 x 240
24	6016 x 4016	510 x 340
42	7952 x 5304	670 x 450

In short – High Quality prints require lots of lovely pixels!!

#### **Photographing Flowers**

Flower photography is a firm favourite among members and while these can be stunning subjects, the technique involves more than just "aiming and shooting". A trip to the small family graveyard was called for and Derek engaged us with the related Romeo and Juliet story "This story is about Valerie Wilcocks, 22 and Johan Bestendig De la Harpe, 21 a young couple in love. It was the summer of 1932. Clarens was only twenty years old, a tiny village established in 1912 with dirt roads and sandstone cottages built by Cornish stonemasons. The young lovers would ride out from the farms of their respective families to meet in secret at a rendezvous in the mountains against the express wishes of their parents because of a long simmering feud between the Wilcocks and the De la Harpe families. One day they were out riding when a summer lightning storm unleashed tragedy in the form of a bolt from the sky and killed both lovers. Their grieving families set aside their differences and buried the young lovers next to each other. Valerie was twenty-two years old, and Johan was twenty-one. They died on 18 December 1932."

After breakfast, we all went and did our own thing. Pierre focused on macro and Kim rode around and manged to sight some Zebra on the hills. A few of us walked up echo gorge which was absolutely stunning. Lunch in Clarens was a raucous affair of tall stories, beer, good food and great company.
